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MATTHEW 17:1-8 ~ ^{1NASB}Six days later Jesus took with Him Peter and James and John his brother, and led them up on a high mountain by themselves. ²And He was transfigured before them; and His face shone like the sun, and His garments became as white as light. ³And behold, Moses and Elijah appeared to them, talking with Him. ⁴Peter said to Jesus, "Lord, it is good for us to be here; if You wish, I will make three tabernacles here, one for You, and one for Moses, and one for Elijah." ⁵While he was still speaking, a bright cloud overshadowed them, and behold, a voice out of the cloud said, "This is My beloved Son, with whom I am well-pleased; listen to Him!" ⁶When the disciples heard this, they fell face down to the ground and were terrified. ⁷And Jesus came to them and touched them and said, "Get up, and do not be afraid." ⁸And lifting up their eyes, they saw no one except Jesus Himself alone.

"Transfigured" is from the Latin, trānsfigūrātus (trầns-fē-gü-rä-tüs). We start with, "Six days later," which creates an obvious _____ with, and distance from, what went before.

Starting with the Syrophoenician Woman, we saw Jesus' ministry change and in chapter 16, another "Feeding Miracle," and the interchange between Jesus and Peter.

Biblically we are being "Transformed." It is best seen in Romans 12:1&2. "Conformed is $συσχηματίζω$ (sü-skā-mä-tē-dzō), meaning to something so that it externally mimics something else.

"Transformed," is μεταμορφόω (mĕ-tä-mŏr-fŏ-ō). This word has to do with allowing your true self to come to the






you're **not sure if we have your number** - let Stacey know.

Today, we **begin** Matthew chapter **17**, with one of the **most amazing confirmations** of Christ's **divinity** in the Bible. Derived from the **Latin translation**,

trānsfigūrātus (träns-fē-gü-rä-tüs), we call it the "Transfiguration of Jesus."



The Apse mosaic, St. Catherine's, Sinai ~

This **picture** is of the oldest known depiction of the Transfiguration. It is a **mosaic** - made of **thousands of tiny tiles**, which was **commissioned** by the Roman Emperor **Justinian 1,500** years ago. It **decorates the Apse** in Saint **Catherine's Monastery** in the **Sinai** Peninsula. Standing on the **left is Elijah**, on the **right Moses**, below Moses is **James**, laying in the **middle is Peter**, and kneeling on the **left is John**.



Here's **both a closeup** of Jesus to see the tiles and a **long shot to get perspective**.

Matthew starts us off with, "Six days later." That phrase is a whole lot more specific and wordier than Matthew usually gets, so we're wise to question why he chose to use it here.

If you think about it, the phrase creates an obvious link, or connection, to what has just happened in chapter 16, but at the same time shows some distance from those events. The two things are related, but different.


Mark and Luke have the same sequencing and use very similar language. In all three accounts, we have a major break in the story of Jesus that is launching from a connection to what just transpired. That emphasis on what went before, while simultaneously presenting something new, will make more sense as we go through it. For now, what's important, is a review of what brought us to this point, so that it will be fresh in our minds. That's always important when studying your Bible and here, it's even more important than normal... As we move forward, we need to remember where we've been.

So, in our last chapter and a half, starting with the Syrophoenician Woman, we saw Jesus' ministry move from a Jew only focus to a universal scope where Gentiles were included. As we recognized, it was an inclusion that would progress in stages over the next several decades, but one that had its genesis, or origin, starting in Matthew 15:21...

From there Jesus essentially duplicated His Manna from Heaven Miracle for a much wider audience. Then, in Chapter 16, we came to Peter's great public confession regarding Jesus, "You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God" (Matthew 16:16). Peter the

Rock, proclaimed Jesus to be the Divine Messiah, and Jesus declared that Peter's faith and his boldness would be the rock, upon which, He would build His church...

So, Jesus opened up to the Disciples, and plainly told them what God had in store for His future. At hearing such a tragic and negative view, Peter indignantly chastised Jesus for His lack of Trust.



Apparently, Jesus' future mission as a sacrificial lamb, didn't resonate with Peter... After publicly rebuking Peter with the famous, "Get behind me, Satan!" (Matthew 16:23) line, Jesus used the rock play on

words again. This time, implying that Peter the Rock, was acting more like the "Stone of stumbling and the rock of offense" (Isaiah 8:14) - the rock that causes one to stumble, instead of the rock to build the church upon.

From those elements, 1) the expansion of the ministry to Gentiles, 2) Peter's declaration concerning Jesus, 3) Jesus' revelation about His future and then 4) Jesus' rebuke of Peter, we get a foretaste of what's to come on the mountain in chapter 17...




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This is an **ancient wall painting** on the **right** and a **700-year-old Illuminated Bible** opened to this **passage in Mark**. Both **depict the Transfiguration**.

Peter along with the Sons of Thunder - the Zebedee Brothers - James and John, formed what is known as Jesus' Inner Circle. I strongly believe that the

Salome and Peter was, of course, the **leader** of the Apostles.



Jesus led the guys up a mountain to be alone with them, and we discover from Luke's account, to pray. Some think that Mt Tabor is the mountain (orange star), but that is almost impossible because, at the time, there was a community, complete with a military outpost, on top. Mt Hermon is another common idea (blue star), but that hummer is nearly 10,000 feet and typically covered in snow - they have a ski resort on it now. The best idea is Mt Meron at 4,000 feet (yellow)

star), but we **can't be sure**, and it really **doesn't matter**.

That brings us to the event. It is told in the three
Synoptic Gospels, but not in John. My guess is John
omitted telling it in detail because he is always
reluctant to mention himself in such a prominent
role.




He **certainly alludes** to it in the **opening** of his Gospel - In **John 1:14**, he says, ^{14NIV}The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us. We have seen his glory, the glory of the one and only Son, who came from the Father, full of grace and truth.

In his first epistle, John wrote, ^{1NIV}That which was from the beginning, which we have heard, which we have seen with our eyes, which we have looked at and our hands have touched—this we proclaim concerning the Word of life. ²The life appeared; we have seen it and testify to it, and we proclaim to you the eternal life, which was with the Father and has appeared to us. ³We proclaim to you what we have seen and heard, so that you also may have fellowship with us. And our fellowship is with the Father and with his Son, Jesus Christ (I John 1:1-3).

Peter talked about it in his second letter where he wrote, ¹⁶For we did not follow cleverly devised stories when we told you about the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ in power, but we were eyewitnesses of his majesty. ¹⁷He received honor and glory from God the Father when the voice came to him from the Majestic Glory, saying, "This is my Son, whom I love; with him I am well pleased." ¹⁸We ourselves heard this voice that came from heaven when we were with him on the sacred mountain (II Peter 1:16–18).

Paul often talks about a principle feature of Christianity involving the change of rebirth - what Jesus called being "Born again."



The basic idea is that a person who has been accepted by God, is from that moment, God's very own child relationally. Everyone is God's child in the sense that He's the Father of everything and everyone, but relationally every person is either the child of Satan or they have been transferred from his family into God's family.

That is a **Biblical reality** - every person either **sports the Mark** of the Beast, or they bear the **Seal** of God.

The Judgment to come will simply reveal to whom each one belongs for all eternity.

Further, Paul insists that each person accepted by God is only accepted on the basis of their identity in Christ Jesus. There is no other way to be accepted by God than to accept the means of acceptance that He has provided in the substitutionary sacrifice of the One and Only Lamb of God (II Corinthians 5:17).



If one has **genuinely embraced** Jesus as Lord and Savior and thereby **been accepted** by Almighty God forevermore, that **status is confirmed** by a **deposit** of the Holy Spirit (II Corinthians 1:22).

No Christian is without the Holy Spirit indwelling them and no non-Christian has the Holy Spirit indwelling them. Now, down to the part we're most interested in today... The whole New Testament repeatedly proclaims and commands that all Holy Spirit-filled Christian Followers of the Lord Jesus Christ will be affected, altered, changed by that reality.

It is impossible to be a Christian and not be transformed by the indwelling Holy Spirit...
Impossible. The change is profound. Certainly, it is completely obvious who is, and who is not, a Christian spiritually. Here in our physical world it's much tougher to discern, but not so difficult that we can't figure it out.

The Truth is that from a person's life, their attitudes, desires, demeaner, words, and actions, we can discern their family connection. We are told not to do that - the position of Judge is already filled, thank you very much... But we could.

As **clear** as the Bible is about **not judging** other people, it's **just as clear** that **every** person does

produce evidence in keeping with their eternal familial status.



Born-again people are not the same people they were beforehand. Paul talks about our old self being dead and buried, while Christ raises us up as a new creation in Him, filled with the Holy Spirit and eager to follow Jesus. No person is the same after genuine salvation.

Paul wrote in, II Corinthians 3:18, 18NIV And we all, who with unveiled faces (Exodus 34) contemplate the Lord's glory, are being transformed into his

image with ever-increasing glory, which comes from the Lord, who is the Spirit.


We're not going to delve into all the amazing things that verse holds, except to say, that everyone who has experienced Jesus, is in the process of being transformed into His image. It is an active process that is done to us by God as we cooperate, yield, surrender to His sculpting efforts.

Biblically we are being <u>"Transformed."</u> It is an awesome concept and it is best seen in Romans 12:1&2, <u>INASB Therefore I urge you, brethren, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies a living and holy sacrifice, acceptable to God, which is your spiritual service of worship. ²And do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind, so that you may prove what the will of God is, that which is good and acceptable and perfect.</u>

Again, there's way too much here to discuss today - no one packs more deep theological information into a few words than Paul.

The main thing I want us to focus on is the, "Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed," bit.

"Conformed," is συσχηματίζω (sü-skā-mä-tē-dzō), meaning to change something so that it externally mimics something else. It is to fashion, or mold something, or someone, so they pass for something on the outside that is foreign to them previously and unnatural to them internally.




This phrase cannot apply to any non-Christian person... A person who hasn't died and been reborn cannot stop being conformed to what is alien to

them... because **not only** is it **not alien** to them; they are **already fully conformed** - you don't conform something that's already conformed. The world is **completely natural to the unsaved**. Only **to a Christian** is there a **dissonance** that the **world tries to bridge**.

That's two interrelated points... First, conforming means that there's conforming that needs to be done... It's no longer who they are externally, or you wouldn't need to conform them. The second point is that as the conforming takes place, the external is changing to be at odds with, alien to, what is internal. As the outside begins matching the world, it no longer matches the inside.

Here it is a negative command, a prohibition - Stop allowing the world to conform you to itself! The implication? That's insane, it's not who you are anymore!

Stop externally conforming to what is in complete opposition to who you now are internally as a Christian filled with the Holy Spirit.



Instead of that ridiculous travesty, allow the Jesus in you burst forth from your inside to your outside. Let who you are internally, be manifested externally...

That is what "Transformed," means. It is μεταμορφόω (mĕ-tä-mŏr-fŏ-ō). This word has to do with allowing your true self to come to the surface.

Do not allow the outside darkness to overtake your inner light, but instead allow your inner light to shine forth into the outside darkness.



How are you going to do that? "By the renewing of your mind"

Renewing the mind is a Holy Spirit change of perspective... It is a realignment of your mind to think as a child of God rather than a product of this evil age.

Mind is $vo\tilde{v}\varsigma$ (nüs). It is the mind, intellect, understanding, consciousness, or perception. Repentance, which is essential to salvation, is the word μετανοέω (mĕ-tä-nŏ-ĕ-ō). The verbal form of $vo\tilde{v}\varsigma$ coupled with the preposition μετά, it means to


change one's mind - to think in a completely different way.

Repentance gets us started, but we need to continually allow God to work on our thinking, specifically because the world is all around us, tempting us to forget who we are... Every trip, I would pray on the bus from the airport parking lot to the terminal... Lord please, as I interact with the physical realm I'm trapped in, do not let me forget who I truly am in You. I encourage you to make that your daily prayer.

This "Transformed," μεταμορφόω, word is the exact same word translated in our Matthew passage as "Transfigured." Jesus allowed His true self to rise to the surface. Matthew states that Jesus' "Face shone like the sun, and his clothes became as white as light." Mark records that, "His clothes became dazzling white, far whiter than any earthly bleach could ever make them." Luke uses a hapax legomenon, a word found nowhere else in the Bible to describe the majesty of the moment. It is ἐξαστράπτω (ĕx-äs-träptō), basically, it means an intense crackling bolt of lightning.




The closest thing is the Greek translation of Ezekiel 1:4, 4NASB As I looked, behold, a storm wind was coming from the north, a great cloud with fire flashing forth continually and a bright light around it, and in its midst something like glowing metal in the midst of the fire."



As the solar irradiance is the effulgence of the sun, so the Son is the effulgence of God. Without it's effulgence - all the stuff, the solar plasma, the light waves and the thermal radiation that emanate from it, the sun would be unseen and from earth unknowable.

The Word of God is the effulgence that makes God knowable. He became flesh and blood and lived among us as one of us showing us Who God is. For a moment on the mountain Jesus allowed that effulgence to peek through His physical earth suit.



Who should appear with Him? None other than Elijah and Moses. The three of them were having a little confab. From Luke's account we know that they were talking about, quote, "His departure which He was about to accomplish at Jerusalem."

It's somewhat cryptic due to a reluctance to be more direct at this stage in the Gospel, but every

Christian hearing these words, then and now, can quickly deduce that they were talking about Jesus arrest, trial, torture and brutal murder that was to come.

Once again, using Luke's account we find that shortly after this event Jesus "Set His face" towards Jerusalem and the fate that awaited Him there. He was steadfast, resolved, resolute in His determination to sacrificially obey in accordance with the Father's plan.

He asks us, who are His and are filled with the Holy Spirit to be willing to do the same - that's what we talked about extensively last week.


Peter, ever the leap before you look dude, blurted out ore of his very well-intentioned nonsense.



From Luke we realize that Moses and Elijah were leaving, and Peter didn't understand what was happening. This was his effort to get them to extend their stay. Nothing more than that. Folks get overly creative trying to explain Peter's plan. It wasn't about the Feast of Booths, or any other deep theological, or religious symbolism.



The three tabernacles, booths, memorials, tents, shelters, whatever they're called that Peter proposes to build are Greek σκηνή (skā-nā), just meaning a temporary shelter, typically a tent. All Peter was doing was trying to prolong the encounter.



up in Pharaoh's palace, the Ten Plagues, the Parting of the Red Sea and the Ten Commandments written on stones by God. I'm sure he wanted to hear some of Elijah's stories about the fire falling from heaven and consuming even the water, about King Ahab and Jezebel, about his ride in a chariot of fire drawn by horses of fire, carried by a whirlwind into heaven.

Always remember to put yourself in the scene.

Wouldn't you try to prolong their visit? Hear their stories?

Now, while Peter was **still blabbing**, God Himself **interrupted** the man. That's **embarrassing**.



a guy who dropped out somewhere along the line before getting to that stage is the first guy scared himself multiple times and quickly put it behind him and moved on. The second person got scared one too many times and was unable to get past it.

Peter and Judas are like that. Peter was repeatedly put in his place. He was rebuked, he was countermanded, he was interrupted by God and he was never deterred by it, he never let being

offended derail him from keeping the faith. Judas was only rebuked once that's recorded and that was more of a group rebuke, but it was enough to offend him so deeply that he betrayed Jesus.

Be a person who does not offend easily and who gets past it quickly. Don't be a Judas and cut off your nose to spite your face.



Anyway, a **brilliantly bright** cloud, **overshadows**? Well, not really. There is **no shadow** in the pure light of the Shekinah Glory - **enveloped** them with light is better.

And Father God thunders out of the spectacularly shiny cloud - Are you kidding right now? You're blown away by mere men, Moses and Elijah, when you've been eating, drinking, walking and talking with My One and Only Son? The Word of the Living God made flesh? "Listen to Him!"

Of course, Peter, James and John, do the only thing that any mortal could do, they fall face down on the ground terrified.

Merciful Jesus came to them and with a touch reassured them and the whole thing was over. You cannot stay on the mountaintop my friends. Try as we might, we can never stay there, the work is in the valleys. Let's roll up our sleeves, and like Jesus, "Set our face" toward the task before us.



Be salt and light in this world, come what may. As the water turns to blood and the animals die, as boils and disease run rampant, as locusts devour, and fiery hail falls and darkness covers the world, never fear for I AM with you, says the Lord.
